Texas Historical August Events

August 1, 1882: The University of Texas at Austin was established by the state legislature.

August 2, 1832: The Battle of Nacogdoches took place, a conflict between Texian settlers and Mexican troops.

August 3, 1956: President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed the law authorizing the establishment of Big Bend National Park.

August 5, 1899: The first active oil well in Texas, Spindletop, was drilled near Beaumont, marking the start of the Texas oil boom. (1st well was drilled in 1866 by Lyne Barret at Nacogdoches only produced 10 barrels a day)

August 10, 1821: Stephen F. Austin received a grant from the Mexican government to begin colonizing Texas with American settlers.

August 18, 1824: The Mexican government passed the Colonization Law, encouraging American settlers to move to Texas.

August 23, 1836: The Texas Declaration of Independence was adopted, declaring Texas independent from Mexico.

August 25, 1836: The town of Houston was founded.

August 26, 1845: The Republic of Texas Congress voted to accept annexation by the United States.

August 19, 1856: The first state fair in Texas was held in Corpus Christi.

August 31, 1839: The first session of the Congress of the Republic of Texas was held in Austin.

National Historical August Events

August 2, 1776 - In Philadelphia, most of the 55 members of the Continental Congress signed the parchment copy of the Declaration of Independence.

August 3, 1923: Calvin Coolidge was sworn in as the 30th president of the United States, hours after the death of President Warren G. Harding.

August 5, 1861: Abraham Lincoln imposed the first federal income tax by signing the Revenue Act.

August 6, 1945: The first atomic bomb was dropped over Hiroshima, marking a significant event in World War II.

August 6, 1965: The Voting Rights Act was passed, aiming to ensure that black people could vote.

August 9, 1974: Richard M. Nixon resigned the presidency due to the Watergate scandal.

August 18, 1920: The 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution was ratified, granting women the right to vote.

August 21, 1959: President Dwight D. Eisenhower signed a proclamation admitting Hawaii to the Union as the 50th state.

August 28, 1963: The March on Washington occurred, where Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. deliv-

Coast Guard History

The Coast Guard's official history began on **4 August 1790** when the first Congress authorized the construction of ten vessels to enforce federal tariff and trade laws and to prevent smuggling. Known variously through the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries as the Revenue Marine and the Revenue Cutter Service, the Coast Guard expanded in size and responsibilities as the nation grew.

The service received its present name in 1915 under an act of Congress that merged the Revenue Cutter Service with the Life-Saving Service, thereby providing the nation with a single maritime service dedicated to saving life at sea and enforcing the nation's maritime laws. The Coast Guard began to maintain the country's aids to maritime navigation, including operating the nation's lighthouses, when President Franklin Roosevelt ordered the transfer of the Lighthouse Service to the Coast Guard in 1939.

In 1946 Congress permanently transferred the Commerce Department's Bureau of Marine Inspection and Navigation to the Coast Guard, thereby placing merchant marine licensing and merchant vessel safety under their purview.

The Coast Guard adopted its trademark racing stripe design in 1967, as a result of the recommendation made to President John F. Kennedy in the spring of 1963 by the industrial design firm of Raymond Loewy/William Snaith, Inc.

The Coast Guard is one of the oldest organizations of the federal government and until Congress established the Navy Department in 1798 they served as the nation's only armed force afloat. The Coast Guard protected the nation throughout their long history and served proudly in every one of the nation's conflicts. Our national defense responsibilities remain one of our most important functions even today.

Since 2003 the Coast Guard has operated as part of the Department of Homeland Security, serving as the nation's front-line agency for enforcing the nation's laws at sea, protecting the marine environment and the nation's vast coastline and ports, and saving life. In times of war, or at the direction of the President, the Coast Guard serves under the Navy Department.

August Facts

August was once the sixth month of the year. In the original ten-month Roman calendar, the month went by the name of Sextilis, meaning "the sixth month" in Latin. It wasn't until around 700BC that August was rudely shoved back in the order of months when January and February were added to the beginning of the year by King Numa Pompilius.

August is also a little bit unique, most of the time at least. In a standard year, there is no other month that begins on the same day of the week as August. In a leap year, however, August begins on the same day of the week as February.

Back in the days of the Anglo-Saxons, the month was called Weod Monath. Its translation of "weed month" is quite literal – in this month weeds and other plants grow the fastest in the northern hemisphere.

Those born in August are brought into this world under one of two star signs. If you were born before August 22nd, you're considered to be a Leo. If you're born on the 23rd or later, you're a Virgo.

August also has two birth flowers – the vibrant multicolored gladiolus and the deep crimson poppy.

August has three birthstones: sardonyx, spinel, and peridot

August was a fateful month for the ancient Roman city of Pompeii. On August 24, 79AD, Mount Vesuvius erupted near the city.
